The **University Learning Center (ULC)** provides peer-driven academic support. Our tutors are faculty-recommended upperclassmen, trained and certified through an internationally recognized association. Tutees will learn to deconstruct course-content and further develop academic success skills such as note-taking, paper editing, and problem-solving strategies.

Students with disabilities can inform tutors about any particular preferences or accommodations. **ULC** tutors will respond to those preferences and, if needed, consult with the Disability Resource Center to ensure accommodations are met.

The **ULC** is **not a remediation service** for underprepared students. More than 1/3 of UNCW students utilize the **ULC** each year; each of those students average 6 visits a year. After utilizing our services, students realize tutoring increases learning *and* academic success.

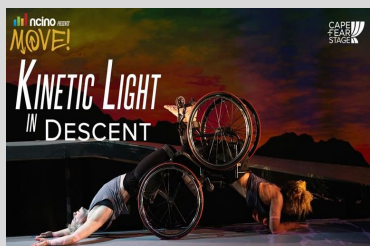
- ◆ Open **Chrome** Internet Browser
