## 5. Additional Academic Opportunities

- College of Health and Human Services Week engages faculty, students, staff, and community stakeholders within the College of Health and Human Services in understanding the specific health issues of SE North Carolina, identifying and working with local health partners, and presenting student and faculty research.
- The Watson College of Education bi-annual Internationalizing Education Conference offers opportunities for university faculty, students, staff and k12 staff to present research, curricular innovations, and community-based projects and posters on a range of topics around international and global education.
- The Watson College of Education also offers students opportunities to complete a portion of their teaching internships in Belize, South Africa, Japan and Kuwait. Additionally, students in the College of Health and Human Services, Watson College of Education, and the College of Arts and Sciences also offer multiple opportunities for students to gain intercultural and academic experience in countries like Costa Rica, China, Ireland, Australia, Spain, Great Britain, Germany, and Wales.
- Supporting and extending these academic opportunities, the University through the Office of International Programs, sponsors an annual Intercultural Week (iWeek) to celebrate the rich diversity found in the Wilmington and UNCW communities. Throughout the week, films, performances, panel discussions and lectures expose faculty, staff, students, and community members to global issues. iWeek culminates in iFest, a festival of international food, dance, music, and info tables from around the world. There are also multiple opportunities available through the Office of Institutional Diversity and Inclusion. This office sponsors an annual Diversity Education Week, as well as regular trainings and workshops throughout the year including Safe Zone Ally Training workshops, intercultural communication, diversity training and other workshops that help prepare students for working, serving, and living in diverse populations.
